

Blackett- Timeline

Before the settlement of New South Wales by Europeans, the Blacktown district was inhabited by the Darug Aboriginal people, who are the traditional owners and ongoing custodians of the land. We pay our respect to elders past and present, and acknowledge the Aboriginal people for their custodianship of the land.

Blackett is named after George Forster Blackett, Superintendent of the Government Cattle Station at Rooty Hill from 1820-1830. The area was developed in the 1970s. The Blackett area was originally part of Mount Druitt. For information before the 1960s please see the Mount Druitt district timeline.
