Willmot-Timeline

Before the settlement of New South Wales by Europeans, the Blacktown district was inhabited by the Darug Aboriginal people, who are the traditional owners and ongoing custodians of the land. We pay our respect to elders past and present, and acknowledge the Aboriginal people for their custodianship of the land.

Named after Thomas Willmot (1851–1938) who was elected the first President of the Blacktown Shire Council. He was President on a number of occasions, 1906–1910 and 1912 – 1913. The suburb was originally to be named St Johns.

The Willmot area was originally part of Mount Druitt. For information before the 1970s please see the Mount Druitt timeline.
