# **Physical Description**

Blacktown Railway Station Signal Building is a face brick banded building, two storeys high. The building has a flat roof parapeted around three sides.

The form is a typical art deco form of a simple rectangle with a circular corner, terminating in a corner tower. The circular corner has steel framed circular windows with a concrete cantilever awning.

Brick work is banded in a simple horizontal relief banding marking floor levels roof height and parapet detail. (Note Building not inspected internally).

# History

## Historical Notes or Provenance

The railway line was first extended to Blacktown in 1860. It was extended to Rooty Hill in 1861 and to Richmond in 1864. The Main Western line was extended to Penrith in 1867 and into the mountains to Wentworth Falls in 1868.

The first Railway Station was a simple hipped roofed brick building that appears in an 1880's photo.

The main station building was built sometime after this in the late Victorian period and was a brick and stone Victorian Neo-Georgian revival building.

The building remained in the 1970's and was demolished sometime after that. A year 2000 upgrading of the Blacktown Railway Station resulted in the demolition of the main station building. Significant buildings remaining at that time included the Signal Building, and the Goods Shed.

The Signal Building is the only substantial building remaining to date.

A series of art deco upgrades of the Stations from Toongabbie to Mt Druitt occurred in the 1940 / 1950 period. All of these barring Mt Druitt Station remain intact.

The Signal Building at Blacktown is the most iconic of this series of buildings reflecting the importance of the station in the network.
