41 Clifton Street sits on a wider block than surrounding houses, and is a characteristic of the 4 roomed early 20th century weatherboard cottages with weatherboarding dressed to resemble stonework. The frontage rooms have French doors.

Roofing is a simple hipped corrugated iron with modern colorbond having replaced the original roofing. The front verandah has been reroofed.

The property contains a large modern colorbond shed to the rear and has modern fencing.

The late Claire Pfoeffer (former resident of No 47) notes that the houses at 49 (demolished for the widening of Sunnyholt Road), 41 and 47 Clifton Street were built by her grandfather and that she was born in one of them. This places their date to the 1900 / 1910 period as she is in her 90's in 2009.

This would accord with the release of the Blacktown Estate by C.J. Turner in the early 1900's. Clifton Street appears in an area marked "Blacktown Estate 852 Lots 40 X 150 all sold and partly built on" on one of the C.J. Turner Auction Maps for the release of the neighbouring Headingly Estate 1913.

The land was originally part of the land grant of 30 Acres to John Wilks. This was on of a series of smaller 30 acre land grants along the Richmond Road / Blacktown Road between the town centres of Blacktown and Prospect, with the large Lethbridge Grant to the West, and the George Allen (Sunnyholt) Grant to the north.
