# **Significance**

### **Statement Of Significance**

This house is an excellent example of country vernacular architecture and may be associated with the development of the Woodstock Cannery which opened in 1887. The House may have been associates with Percy Lamb son of Walter Lamb who developed Woodstock.

#### Criteria a)

#### **Historical Significance**

The Cottage at 357 is of high local historical significance as a remaining cottage from the initial victorian era development along Rooty Hill Road North as part of the Woodstock Cannery Estate. It is significant in association with "Alroy" on the adjacent lot as an originally similar victorian brick residence.

### Criteria b)

#### **Historical Association**

## Significance

The Cottage is associated with Walter Lamb of Woodstock, also in Plumtpon, whose establishment of the Cannery works in the area was the catalyst for the development of a town centre in Plumpton.

#### Criteria c)

### Aesthetic/Technical Significance

The cottage is of aesthetic significance as a remaining brick cottage with a steep roof and surrounding verandah and a plan layout similar to the original layout of Alroy adjacent. The cottage is typical of late victorian brick cottages in the district. The setting of the cottage has been detrimentally impacted by adjacent buildings on the site, but it still retains some of its landscape setting including mature palms in the frontage garden.

## Criteria e)

#### **Research Potential**

The cottage and grounds have the potential to yeild information and remains relating to the intial settlement of Plumpton along Rooty hill Road.

#### Criteria f)

#### Rarity

The cottage is a rare remaining example of the Victorian development along Rooty Hill Road North relating to the establishemnt of Plumpton as a village centre.

A single storey brick house with hipped roof in galvanised iron. The front and sides are surrounded by a verandah supported by timber posts. The frontage displays attractive french doors to the main rooms.

The plan arrangement is a typical four roomed cottage with a central hall, and an attache kitchen wing.

The exteriors are face brick with internal walls rendered and then relined over.

# **History**

#### **Historical Notes or Provenance**

### **Updated**

The land on which the cottage is located was originally granted to Walter Lamb as part of a substantial grant of 3000 acres in the Plumpton area in 1871. Initially known as Woodstock after the name of Walter Lambs house built on the eastern side of Rooty Hill road in 1878, the area became known as Plumpton after the name given to a particular form of Grey hound racing that Walter Lamb developed at his Woodstock Estate.

The estate was gradually subdivided by Lamb in 1883 and he encouraged orchards and fruit growing in assocaition with his Cannery.

The cottage is located on Lot 3 of Section 1 and is indicated as being present in an 1891 subdivision map of the area.

The Race Course (New Plumpton coursing) was directly opposite the site on which the cottage was built.

The house is closely associated with Alroy, and the Cannery works established by Walter Lamb of Woodstock, that established Plumpton. It is likely to have been built c 1888 in association with the cannery works as possibly a managers cottage, as the brickwork displays a similar style to other contemporary buildings including Alroy.
