45 Devitt Street (relocated to 2 Wallace St, Blacktown), along with 47 Clifton Street, 41 Clifton Street and 2 Sarsfield Street, is a relatively intact remaining example of the Blacktown Estate Subdivision from circa 1913 into small inner urban residential lot sizes along the railway line, in relation to the developing Blacktown Town Centre.

Aesthetic/Technical Significance

45 Devitt Street is a rare highly intact remaining example of a typical early interwar suburban home remaining near the Town Centre of Blacktown. There is very little remaining housing stock from the original suburban subdivisions of Blacktown which changed from a rural village to a suburban area around the Edwardian / Interwar period. As such, remaining intact houses from this period, many of which are concentrated in the Blacktown and Headingly Estate areas, are an important reminder of this foundational period in Blacktown's history.

45 Devitt Street is a typical interwar weatherboard cottage with a gable to hip split frontage front and verandah, with a brick balustrade.

The cottage retains all its original internal and external detail including internal timber lined walls and plate rail, valance fretwork, fireplaces, stained glass casement windows, rusticated weatherboard cladding and fibre cement gable, brick balustrade with timber tops and fretwork to the verandah, original corrugated iron sheeting.

The cottage at 45 Devitt Street would be likely to have been the first house on the site after subdivision in the Blacktown Estate released by C.J. Turner in the early 1900's. Railway Parade (which later became Devitt Street) appears in an area marked "Blacktown Estate 852 Lots 40 X 150 all sold and partly built on", on one of the C.J. Turner Auction Maps for the release of the neighbouring Headingly Estate 1913 / 1920.

The land was originally part of the land grant of 30 Acres to John Wilks. This was one of a series of smaller 30 acre land grants along the Richmond Road / Blacktown Road between the town centres of Blacktown and Prospect, with the large Lethbridge Grant to the West, and the George Allen (Sunnyholt) Grant to the north.
