This is preserved within a public reserve which runs from the Penfold gates at the Great Western Highway through along the route of the former driveway up to the Minchinbury Winery site.

The driveway does not reach the winery site as it remains at present as this has been subdivided with surrounding housing. The end of the row of olives marks the end of the original drive to the inner entrance to the Winery site. The end of the row of olives is now connected to the site by a small footpath that runs between houses to Minchin Drive.

History

Historical Notes or Provenance

The Minchinbury Winery was established by Dr Charles McKay who purchased the Minchinbury Estate in 1859. Prior to this the property had been granted to William Minchin 1819 and held by his family for grazing after his death until sold to Charles Mackay. Mackay built the first Cellars on the property and commenced the vineyards and wine making in the area.

Mackay sold the Cellars and the vineyards to James Angus in 1885. Angus developed the winery and employed Leo Buring in 1902 as manager, a wine maker trained in Germany and France, then working in the Barossa Valley. Buring introduced the skills and techniques for the making of Champagne and established the first Australian Champagne "Minchinbury" Champagne at the site. Buring remained at the winery until his retirement.

The winery was purchased from the Angus family in 1913 by Penfolds who retained winemaking at the site until 1978 when the land was sold to the NSW government. Buring remained as manager through the Penfolds establishment years and later established Leo Buring wines later in his life.

Leo Buring established the avenue of 100 Olive trees to line the driveway from the Great Western Highway in 1812. The Olive oil was used as an important ingredient in the wine making process to prevent oxidisation.

The avenue included an early reinforced concrete post and metal rail Gate and fence structure which has since deteriorated and mostly been removed. The early methods of reinforced concrete are also seen through the winery complex, and Leo Burings own house at Leonay (Heritage item under Penrith City Council). The original gates and posts have been replaced with a later c 1960's Penfolds wall and gates.
