Significance

Statement Of Significance

St Phillips Church Cemetery is part of a former Church complex associated with Clydesdale.

Criteria a)

Historical Significance

The Site of St Phillips Church and Cemetery is of State significance as the remaining colonial graveyard of the early settlers of the area predating the Riverstone cemetery. The grave yard contains the remains of 12 people including 4 known burials and extant headstones dating between 1848 -1872. The Graveyard contains the remains of one of the Descendants of Colebee who received the first Land grant to an aboriginal person as a reward for service by Governor Macquarie in 1814.

Criteria b)

Historical Association

Significance

The Cemetery has high social significance as the site of burial for Jane Lock a descendant of Colebee (a Darug man) who along with Nurrangingy had received the first Land Grant in 1814 from Governor Macquarie near the Blacktown Institute.

Criteria c)

Aesthetic/Technical Significance

The setting of the cemetery overlooking south creek within a rural landscape is of high aesthetic significance.

Criteria d)

Social/Cultural Significance

The cemetery has high social significance as the burial place of twelve colonial early settlers in the area.

Criteria e)

Research Potential

The site and surrounding area have a high potential to reveal the remains of further burials and the foundations of the form St Phillips Church.

Criteria f)

Rarity

The graveyard is a rare remaining small church graveyard within the Sydney Metropolitan area.

Criteria g)

Representative

The graveyard marks the site of the form St Phillips Church.

History

Historical Notes or Provenance

St Phillips Cemetery is associated with the Clydesdale Estate which originally encompassed the land on which it stood. St Phillips Church and cemetery which once occupied the site was in existence by 1848 and was mentioned in a lease advertisement for the property.

Charles Tomson, owner of Clydesdale Estate sold 2 Acres for the church in 1845 on the eastern side of Richmond Road for the construction of a church for the community. The church built of brick and stone was built by local labour and was consecrated in 1846.

The church building was severely damaged by flood in 1890 but was repaired and reused, but continued to decline until by 1912 it was referred to as "a few tumbledown pillars and a mass of broken bricks " SMH Sept 1912. It was closed shortly after 1890 and the congregation moved to Riverstone.

The graveyard predates the Riverstone Cemetery and contains the graves of early settlers, including the descendants of Colebee (who had received one of the first Aboriginal Land Grants near the Blacktown Native Institute on Richmond Road) through the Locke Family.

The Cemetery contains 12 registered interments between 1848 and 1872 and four headstones remain visible within a timber post and railed fenced area.

The oldest grave that remain identifiable is dated 1854.
