Significance

Statement Of Significance

Belvedere is a good example of a Victorian Regency rural house featuring a symmetrical front and encircling bullnose verandah and one of a small number of surviving brick houses from the mid to late Victorian period in Western Sydney. The house has some potential to yield further information about construction date and methods through the protection of both the external and internal fabric of the place. The house has social significance through its association with the Lawson Family, particularly Dr Lawson who was one of the first doctors in the district.

Belvedere has an association of more than 80 years with the Lawson family, in particular with Dr George Lawson who was the only local doctor in Rooty Hill.

Criteria a)

Historical Significance

Belvedere has historical significance to the Rooty Hill district as a remaining home from the Victorian era of large country villas and farms located in Rooty Hill.

Criteria b)

Historical Association Significance

Belvedere has an association of more than 80 years with the Lawson family, in particular with Dr George Lawson who was the only local doctor in Rooty Hill.

Criteria c)

Aesthetic/Technical Significance

Belvedere is a good example of a Victorian Regency rural house featuring a symmetrical front and an encircling bullnose verandah. Belvedere also contains significant interiors due to the continued ownership of the property by the same family.

The grounds contain remaining garden plantings from the 1940's era around earlier tree plantings, which contirbute to its setting.

Belvedere has some potential to yield further information about construction date and methods.

Physical Description

Belvedere is a single storey Victorian Regency brick style house located on the western side of Rooty Hill Road South. It has a large hipped roof of corrugated steel with dormer windows. A bull nosed verandah wraps around the house. The original entry on the north side of the building has a central door case with sidelights and a top light flanked by double hung windows.

The Grounds around the house include a well and pump and retain the immediate house garden areas, including a number of remnant trees from the 19th early 20th century period of the property, and later 1940's onwards garden plantings.

Historical Notes or Provenance

Samuel York, a station master, purchased an allotment of land at Rooty Hill in 1882. It is thought that he constructed the present house. Following York's death in 1917, the property was sold to Alexander Leckie Elphinstone, a Sydney builder/architect. He sold the property in 1921 to Annie Graham who sold it to Dr George Langrigg Lawson in 1923.

Dr Lawson was born in England and had migrated to Australia. He served in the Imperial Bushman's Contingent at the Boer War. After purchasing Belvedere in 1923 he moved there with his second wife Marjorie. The front two rooms of the house were used for his medical practice.

In 1937 George and Marjorie travelled to England with their son John Langrigg Curwen Lawson (b. 1926) returning to Australia in 1948. John completed his education in England, graduating from the Sandhurst Military College. On returning to Australia, John entered Sydney University to study Forestry but was forced to leave his studies when his father died. He became a successful builder and in 1959 married Elizabeth. John Lawson died in 1988, leaving the house to his wife.

John Lawson undertook extensive work to the house. He reversed all the external bricks, added a lounge and kitchen to the rear, constructed attic rooms with a stair leading from the rear of the house, and removed two chimneys.

It is not known who named the house Belvedere. The name was not used by the Lawson family.
