The Railway Line was first extended to Blacktown in 1860. It was extended to Rooty Hill in 1861 and Richmond in 1864. The Main Western Line was extended to Penrith in 1867 and into the Blue Mountains to Wentworth Falls in 1868.

The first platform at Seven Hills was established in 1869. There are no buildings remaining from this period.

The current station appears in a photo of a major train derailment in 1960, indicating it had been completed before that date.
